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this textbook provides a critical introduction to major research topics and current approaches in linguistic typology the study of structural variation in human language and of the limits on that variation jae jung song draws on a wide range of cross linguistic data to describe what linguistic typology has revealed both about language in general and about the rich variety of ways in which meaning and expression are achieved in the world s languages following an introduction to the subject matter and its history the first part of the book explores theoretical issues and approaches as well as practical considerations such as sampling methods and data collection in the second part chapters examine variation in particular phenomena such as word order case alignment and evidentiality marking each chapter concludes with study questions and suggestions for further reading the volume will be suitable for undergraduate and graduate students in the fields of linguistic typology and language universals and as secondary reading for cross linguistically focused courses in phonology morphology syntax and semantics

the experience of having taught english language and morphology syntax in particular for more than seven years convinced the author that students of linguistics and translation mostly need a solid grounding in the course of morphology and syntax once they have a basic understanding of these two important areas they have little trouble mastering english language as a whole hence both morphology and syntax are important parts of linguistic knowledge and constitute a component of student s mental grammar of course the more courses are required of students within their discipline the more they can benefit from the fields inside their major such factors often help students develop a positive attitude towards linguistics to be sensitized to the morphological and syntactic system of the language while being exposed to both morphology and syntax and especially in an unfamiliar area obviously an introductory book such as this has several limitations first there are entire subbranches of morphology and syntax that are not included in terms of content this book delimits both its scope and audience by shedding new light on a subject the problems and obscurities of which look inexhaustible therefore a book of this kind is an attempt to on the one hand to make morphology and syntax which usually appear to be incredible complicated at first glance easier and on the other hand keep the standard high so that even postgraduate students can benefit from it because the author strongly believes that students learn best by doing exercises and to this end he has added dozens of practice exercises in general these require more research or analysis beyond what can be accomplished within a single classroom period these exploratory exercises can also form the basis for short papers therefore the book can be of immense help not only to students of linguistics and translation but also to professors of linguistics and translation and research supervisors as well as advisors around the globe and in the arab world in particular

the present volume deals with hitherto unexplored issues on the interaction of morphology and syntax these selected and invited papers mainly concern cushitic and chadic languages the least described members of the afroasiatic family three papers in the volume explore one or more typological characteristics across an entire language family or branch while others focus on one or two languages within a family and the implications of their structures for the family the phylum or linguistic typology as a whole the diversity of topics addressed within the present volume reflects the great diversity of language structures and functions within the afroasiatic phylum

the standard view of the form meaning interfaces as embraced by the great majority of contemporary grammatical frameworks consists in the assumption that meaning can be associated with grammatical form in a one to one correspondence under this view composition is quite straightforward involving concatenation of form paired with functional application in meaning in this book we discuss linguistic phenomena across several grammatical sub modules morphology syntax semantics that apparently pose a problem to the standard view mapping out the potential for deviation from the ideal of one to one correspondences and develop formal accounts of the range of phenomena we argue that a constraint based perspective is particularly apt to accommodate deviations from one to many correspondences as it allows us to impose constraints on full structures such as a complete word or the interpretation of a full sentence instead of deriving such structures step by step most of the papers in

this volume are formulated in a particular constraint based grammar framework head driven phrase structure grammar the contributions investigate how the lexical and constructional aspects of this theory can be combined to provide an answer to this question across different linguistic sub theories

syncretism where a single form serves two or more morphosyntactic functions is a persistent problem at the syntax morphology interface it results from a mismatch whereby the syntax of a language makes a particular distinction but the morphology does not this pioneering book provides a full length study of inflectional syncretism presenting a typology of its occurrence across a wide range of languages the implications of syncretism for the syntax morphology interface have long been recognised it argues either for an enriched model of feature structure thereby preserving a direct link between function and form or for the independence of morphological structure from syntactic structure this book presents a compelling argument for the autonomy of morphology and the resulting analysis is illustrated in a series of formal case studies within network morphology it will be welcomed by all linguists interested in the relation between words and the larger units of which they are a part

world knowledge they have divided the work into four parts concerned with word structure sentence structure processing syntax and morphology at the interfaces and a comparison of different models of syntactic and morphological processing in the neurophysiological domain the book is directed at graduate students and researchers in theoretical linguistics psycho and neurolinguistics neurophysiology and psychology

the aim of this book first published in 1979 is to provide a sound basic introduction to the study of grammar within linguistics the work concentrates primarily on the core of grammatical theory rather than a single narrow theoretical viewpoint after introductory chapters on the study of language and language as a semiotic system the precise tasks of grammatical theory are clearly outlined the aims and problems of generative grammar are then described and the importance of grammatical analysis is highlighted the central part of the book is devoted to the fundamental questions of syntactic theory and a detailed study of morphology finally the author surveys the problems of grammar beyond the sentence this title will be of interest to students of linguistics

this book centers on the idea that some verbs and other argument structure constructions have an inherently different propensity to realize lexically unfamiliar arguments independently of lexical semantic meaning this notion is explored both qualitatively using selected examples and quantitatively using large amounts of corpus data in both cases primarily from english and german
