Case Study 2 The Conflict of Interest You are a nurse working in a hospital A patient a close friend of yours requires a specific treatment You know the patients insurance will likely deny coverage but you believe this treatment is crucial for their recovery What do you do Applying the Winningham Model Identify the Dilemma You are facing a conflict of interest balancing your professional duties with your personal relationship Gather Information Understand the hospitals policies regarding patient advocacy explore alternative treatment options and research your friends insurance coverage Explore Alternatives You could Advocate for your friend Discuss their case with the

insurance company emphasizing the medical necessity of the treatment Refrain from advocacy Maintain professional distance but inform your friend of their options Seek advice Consult with a supervisor or ethics committee for guidance Consider Consequences Each alternative has potential repercussions Advocating for your friend Could be perceived as favoritism and could damage your reputation Refrain from advocacy Could leave your friend without necessary treatment and strain your friendship Seeking advice Could provide clarity but may also lead to a delay in decisionmaking Make a Decision Based on your understanding of the hospitals policies your friends needs and the potential consequences you must choose the most ethical path 3 Evaluate the Outcome Reflect on the decisions impact and its implications for future patient interactions Case Study 3 The Confidentiality Conundrum You are a therapist working with a client who has been diagnosed with a serious mental illness The client confides in you that they have plans to harm themselves What are your ethical obligations Applying the Winningham Model Identify the Dilemma You are faced with the ethical obligation to maintain patient confidentiality while also having a duty to protect the client from harm Gather Information Assess the clients risk level understand your states legal requirements regarding mandatory reporting and consider available resources within your practice Explore Alternatives You could Confront the client Engage in a therapeutic conversation to understand their intentions and address potential triggers Contact authorities Report the situation to law enforcement or a mental health crisis team Seek consultation Consult with colleagues or a supervisor for guidance on how to manage the situation Consider Consequences Each alternative has potential implications Confronting the client Could potentially deter the client from selfharm but may also lead to distrust or resistance Contacting authorities Could intervene and prevent harm but may also violate client confidentiality and erode trust Seeking consultation Could provide valuable insights and support but may also lead to delays in intervention Make a Decision Based on your assessment of the clients risk and your understanding of legal and ethical obligations you must act swiftly and decisively Evaluate the Outcome Reflect on the effectiveness of your intervention and its impact on the clients wellbeing and your professional practice Conclusion Ethical decisionmaking is a continuous process of reflection analysis and action By adopting a structured approach like the Winningham model we can equip ourselves to navigate the complexities of ethical dilemmas with confidence and integrity Remember the most important guiding principle is to act in accordance with your values always striving for the greater good 4
